
Introducing Updated Initial & Ongoing Requirements for Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) Services

February 17, 2021

Optum Maryland wishes to alert **ABA providers** and **referring facilities** of updated requirements for both initial requests for ABA services and for those receiving ongoing ABA services. The updated initial and ongoing requirements to access ABA will go into effect on **February 24, 2021.**

ABA services continue to be available to Maryland Medicaid recipients who are under the age of 21, reside in a home/community setting, have a confirmed diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), and have been referred for ABA services by a qualified health care professional. ABA services will continue to be reviewed based on medical necessity for the services being requested.

Maryland Department of Health (MDH) would like to first ensure all providers are aware of the following definitions:



MDH is making the following changes to the initial and ongoing requirements for ABA services:

- Participant's age at time of diagnosis will now determine if/when a Clinical Confirmation Form (CCF) is required
 - If participant was 3 years and 1 month or older at time of diagnosis by a Qualified Health Care Professional (QHCP)
 - Diagnosis of ASD is confirmed via the completed Comprehensive Diagnostic Evaluation (CDE) submitted, no further documentation required initially or on an ongoing basis
 - If participant was 3 years and 0 months or younger at time of diagnosis by a QHCP
 - Diagnosis of ASD is confirmed via the complete CDE and is valid for 2 years
 - If it has been more than 2 years since confirmed diagnosis by a QHCP; a CCF is required
- 2. Evaluations completed by non-qualified health care professionals (i.e., School Psychologists and/or Speech Pathologists) will no longer be accepted
 - The form previously titled "Physician Confirmation of ASD" is retired and no longer valid
 - See <u>COMAR</u> 10.09.28.01 and .03 for definitions and participant eligibility requirements

CDE is required to be completed by a QHCP Referral / prescription for ABA services by a QHCP dated within the last 6 months Clinical Confirmation Form (CCF) required ONLY IF participant was 3.0 years or younger at time of ASD diagnosis and it has been 2+ years since date of diagnosis

Requirements to CONTINUE to Access ABA Treatment

 Once a participant is engaged in ABA treatment, only in the following circumstance would a CCF be required for a participant to CONTINUE to access ABA treatment

Participant was 3.0
years or younger at time of diagnosis

A CCF will be required to confirm that ASD continues to be a confirmed diagnosis

In an effort to further outline what these requirements look like in action, please reference the following fictional scenarios to assist in explaining the updated requirements.

Scenario 1: CCF Required prior to starting ABA services

Ruby's parent has sent in documentation for her to access the ABA benefit. The CDE meets requirements and per the report, Ruby was 2 years 9 months at age of diagnosis. Currently, Ruby is 11 years old. Given that Ruby was diagnosed before the age of 3 and it has been more than 2 years since the age of diagnosis, a clinical confirmation form will be required initially to accompany the CDE Ruby's family shared. The clinical confirmation form requires that a QHCP that has seen Ruby within the last 6 months provide a confirmation of her diagnosis of ASD. Once the diagnosis is confirmed no clinical confirmation form would be required of Ruby's family on an ongoing basis

Scenario 2: No CCF Required prior to starting ABA services

Barrett's primary care doctor has sent over an evaluation for review as Barrett was recently diagnosed with ASD. The CDE meets requirements and per the report, Barrett was 4 years 4 months at age of diagnosis. Currently, Barrett is 8 years old. Given that Barrett was diagnosed after the age of 3.1, no clinical confirmation form will be required either initially or ongoing. The diagnosis is considered confirmed.

Scenario 3: No CCF required prior to starting ABA services, but is required after ABA treatment has started

Scenario 3: Harvey's social worker sends over an evaluation for Harvey to access the ABA benefit. The CDÉ meets requirements and per the report, Harvey was 1 year 10 months at age of diagnosis. Currently, Harvey is 2 years old. While Harvey was diagnosed before age 3, it has not yet been 2 years since that diagnoses was given. Therefore, no additional information would be required initially. However, once Harvey starts ABA services, a clinical confirmation form will be requested 9 months out from the date the diagnosis will "expire" The date the diagnosis will expire is when Harvey is 3 years 10 months old.
